Message from the Executive Director

“Hard times don’t create heroes. It is during the hard times when the ‘hero’ within us is revealed.” — Bob Riley

My message for this newsletter has not been a priority for me over the last few months. There is a pandemic crossing our world at an alarming rate with little understanding, much uncertainty, and great fear. My heart and mind could not find a message that would be uplifting or encouraging as I witnessed the ugly side of humanity emptying shelves, hoarding supplies, touting conspiracy theories, and throwing around blame and hoping it would stick somewhere. I struggled to see how we as neighbours, as a community, and as a nation could get through this. Maybe I procrastinated because I needed time to see the real truth behind this crisis... and that is ***“Hard times don’t create heroes. It is during the hard times when the ‘hero’ within us is revealed.”***

These are the doctors, nurses, lab technicians, paramedics, pharmacists, medical researchers, and hospital staff that are on the front lines putting their own lives and the lives of their family members at risk. They work without protective equipment, take double and triple shifts because that is what they do. They help those that are most in need of medical interventions.

The heroes are also the grocery workers, cab drivers, delivery people, truckers, volunteers, and many others that provide services that keep our food, supplies, and deliveries coming so we can stay at home and be safe.

The heroes are also the people that go to work every day to support seniors, people with disabilities, and other members of our community that need help so they too can stay at home and be safe.

Then there are the heroes that I work with every day... they work at Mountain Rose Women’s Shelter in support of women and children fleeing violence. There are 28 of them (27 women and 1 man) that work shift work, 365 days a year to provide support to vulnerable families; always providing a comforting word, a warm heart, and a safe haven. These heroes have the same fears that you do – will I get sick, will I take it home to my family – but they show up every day, take on extra shifts, and ask “how can I help”. They cook, sanitize, do laundry, listen, answer the crisis line, change diapers, plan in-door activities and make the women and children, who are experiencing one of the most traumatic times of their lives, feel safe.

I witness this every day at the shelter but to be honest, I think I get so busy that I don’t really see them. Maybe the real reason that I procrastinated writing this message was that I needed to be reminded that we have heroes around us every day. You might not recognize them if you passed them on the street, they don’t wear capes, but if you could just open your eyes and heart enough, you might be able to **reveal the hero that is within us all.**

During Covid 19 pandemic, The Mountain Rose Centre is open and working for the community:

- The safety of women, children, and seniors facing abuse, as well as the safety of shelter workers, are our top priorities.
- Women's shelters remain the safest place for a woman fleeing violence. Our Shelter and Community Services are adapting our services to meet the physical distancing, disinfecting, and isolation requirements by public health officials so we can continue to meet the safety needs of the women, children, and seniors in our communities.
- Shelters are more than a bed. Our members are trained to help women assess their danger levels and create safety plans. We encourage anyone experiencing violence or abuse to contact the Outreach Workers and they will work to support your safety. Call 403-845-5339 to be connected to The Mountain Rose Centre.
- We know that in times of natural disasters, increased anxiety and external stressors increase and worsen domestic violence situations.
- We are also in contact with partners across the province to share and learn from innovative responses in our sector to this extraordinary situation.
- If you or someone you know is in immediate danger, call 911. If you suspect that someone's life may be in danger, please call 911. To speak to someone at the shelter, call our toll-free 24/7 line, 1-877-845-4141.

Outreach Services



We are happy to announce that we started our Women's Support Group on March 12th and had a great turnout for our first meeting. The focus of our group is to help women understand domestic violence and to support them to stay safe. We as an outreach team realize that this is an important service to offer both to our in-house clients and our community members. Unfortunately, we have had to postpone any further meetings due to COVID 19. We will resume our meetings as soon as we are able to.

We are also excited about the many possibilities to offer learning opportunities to our community in the fall. We are currently in the process of preparing a 'Leading Change' curriculum focusing on training our youth to recognize and stand up against abuse. We are also preparing to offer training on elder abuse and prevention.

During this time of COVID 19 we would like to continue our support of our clients and are therefore touching base with individuals over the phone. We hope, alongside everyone else, that everyone stays healthy and that we can soon return to offering our full services.

Family Support Services



The Family Support Program supports moms and her children that are in Emergency Shelter and continues to support the family once they leave shelter to move into a safe and stable home of their own. The Family Support Program provides information on family resources and supports within the community and assists families in making supportive connections within the community.

The Program also works with families in Mountain Rose Center's Transitional Housing Program, providing child care for pre-school aged children while their mom's engage in programming.

Enrichment Program activities, which are family centered and focus on families connecting with each other, forming healthy relationships with other families, and forming connections to programs within the community, are planned regularly as well! We have recently engaged in fun indoor activities such as swimming, crafting, and bowling, partnering with other Mountain Rose Center Programs to enable all families that could benefit from the Enrichment Program to be able to attend the program. Unfortunately the Enrichment Program is not hosting activities at this time of social distancing but we are providing care packages to families in social isolation, consisting of family game and activity ideas, craft materials and ideas, some toys, and positive messages of encouragement. And we are still available by phone and email to support families!

PCAP – Parent Child Assistance Program

Life is hard... and it doesn’t get any easier. We, as society, are locked up in our homes. We are missing everything that we took for granted. We watch as our precious time is being wasted. We need to make changes in how we think, how we act, and how we show up to life.

The PCAP Program is in a little bit of a stand still. There are no face to face meetings, no appointments, and no physical support for my clients. I am connecting with them over the phone and through text messages. But...they are thriving. They have the precious time with their kids without interruption, everyone is in the same boat as they are, and they are not missing out on stuff due to social anxiety, or wishing they could have the courage to go somewhere different. They are feeling more normal than they have ever. The playing fields have evened for them. They feel less of outcasts and more as part of the community. These are to people that we could learn from in this moment in time. They can make a meal out of anything, they can make money stretch like it’s their job, and they can fill time with nothing “special” to do. Please remember these people when society goes back to the high paced, selfish, blind, and busy ways. They were the ones surviving on nothing before this virus.

Clearwater County Housing Support Services



Housing Support Services began in October 2014. Clients continue to join the program. Some are successful, some more challenging. The Housing Support Services program provides support for everyone in our community and surrounding area.

Some exciting changes have come our way at the Mountain Rose Center. Our services have expanded within our organization, and roles have changed. Our Second Stage Transitional Housing, which provides safe housing for women and children leaving domestic violence, is now open. Our present Housing Support Coordinator will now be taking on the role of the Second Stage Supervisor. The torch has now been passed on to a new Housing Support Coordinator, who will continue to provide the services required to meet client’s needs.
